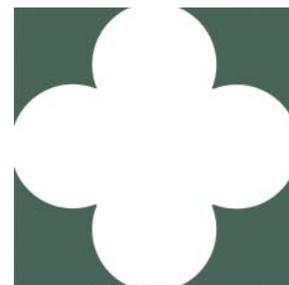

Is There Such a Thing as Quiet Pride?

While much of the world thinks of June as wedding season, for me it always invokes thoughts of Pride. And again this year, like every year, we as a church community and each of us as individuals must decide how we will participate in Pride activities. My personal choices regarding Pride have varied a lot over the years.

My most memorable experience at a Gay Pride parade happened in 1987. I was the pastor of Calvary Metropolitan Community Church in Redwood City, CA, just south of San Francisco, and several of us went to "the city" for the big parade. I remember wishing I could watch the parade, but I also wanted to march in it. MCC churches were featured that year. AIDS was ravaging the Bay Area, and churches like mine were doing heroic ministry. The MCC contingent was given Position #2 in the parade, right behind the Dykes on Bikes. Accompanied by the rumble of Harley Davidson motorcycles, about 100 of us sang hymns as we marched all along the parade route. We were greeted with cheers and tears. That evening we hosted a service of remembrance at a large local church. Hundreds of people came to light candles,

pray, sing, and cry. We were desperate to feel pride that day. Our lives were bathed in grief, watching young men die horrible deaths in the days before effective treatments for HIV were available. And I did feel pride. I was proud to be gay, proud to be a pastor to people in such need of pastoring, and proud to be cheered on in the vanguard of that huge parade.

One of my most recent Pride experiences falls on the other end of the spectrum in 2016. My husband Jim Ginn preached at Seattle First Baptist on the morning of June 26, and then the two of us walked down to Westlake Center to watch the parade, cheer on Diverse Harmony, and display our SFBC Pride T-shirts. The parade was well underway by the time we got there, and downtown was jammed. What I remember most is the plethora of politicians in the parade, and the corporate contingents – groups from many of large employers around the region. We stayed for about half an hour and then escaped back up Capitol Hill. I felt proud at church when Jim G preached, but was mostly just overwhelmed by the crowd at the parade, and eager to get away from all the people.

A few years back I privately questioned whether Pride parades had run their course, like drill teams of Shriners doing coordinated movements with lawn mowers on the Fourth of July. But that's simply not true. Perhaps many of us don't need our pride boosted by a parade or a party these days. We're married and accepted socially and openly active in our communities in hundreds of ways. But our city still has kids who grow up being told they are an abomination. Our world still has youths who are murdered by their own parents for being homosexual. And we have a president who could ratchet up anti-gay sentiment in the U.S. any time he needs another scapegoat.

Our plans for Pride as a church may seem a bit sedate this year. On Sunday, June 24, we'll have a Pride worship service. This year we don't have an official contingent marching in the parade, and we are not providing new Pride T-shirts this year either, but we encourage people to wear the ones they already have to Pride events. And I think this low-key response is OK. For now, anyway. But all of us must remain aware, keep our ears and eyes open, and be ready to fill in the gaps in the parade in a future year if politicians and businesses suddenly find it less convenient to be Out and Proud.

As summer approaches, our programming on Wednesday nights will vary during the month of June.


On **June 6** we will not have dinner or a program. Please note that the choir does not rehearse on this evening either.

More on Immigrant and Refugee Outreach

On May 20, Briana Brannan, who coordinates immigrant and refugee accompaniment for Church Council of Greater Seattle (CCGS), led a presentation at SFBC to provide some elucidation of the challenges facing the various undocumented individuals in our community. She also helped clarify the distinction between several categories that it can be difficult to discern—'immigrants', 'refugees', 'asylum seekers'—as well as broadening our sense of what we mean when we talk about the "sanctuary movement." It was a very enlightening session, and in addition to the information provided, Briana also let us know about several upcoming opportunities for involvement in our community. Here's a brief list:

- Provide **short-term private housing hospitality** with CCGS. The current primary need is for individuals and families seeking asylum while awaiting work permits or becoming financially stable, generally for 3–4 months. - On Friday, June 8, 1–3 p.m., attend a **Detention Lottery Interactive Theater** experience at Saint Mark's Cathedral.

Two Decades of Parish Nursing at SFBC

Parish Nursing, now called Faith Community Nursing, was developed in the mid 1980's by a Lutheran minister and Chaplain Granger Westberg. He saw that nurses could play a huge role in the spiritual, mental and physical health of a faith community.

In 1996 Myrna Easton took a course developed by Westberg and with the approval of Dr. Rod Romney became SFBC's first parish nurse. In 1998 Ann Keppler joined Myrna in this ministry and continued the program after Myrna became a snow bird with her husband George in 2001. Ann served for many years until she needed to be home to care for her husband after his accident.

Last summer Pastor Tim Phillips was talking about restarting the parish nurse program and Sue Ross stepped forward and is now serving as our Faith Community Nurse. The flowers our nurses posed with were provided by Sami Hoag and Jeannie Dorn to honor our Faith Community Nurses.

Companis Welcomes New Associate Executive Director

Companis is excited to announce the appointment of Karen Hundrieser as our new Associate Executive Director, beginning June 1. Karen will help lead Companis operations and programs as demand for our services continues to grow and deepen in our community. Karen's passion for people, management experience, and proven track record in advocacy and activism for our neighbors' well-being makes her a great addition to the Companis Team. She fills the role Rita Hibbard held for five years until her retirement last December.

Karen is well-known to our Companis Workers: she's served the past nine months with Elizabeth Gregory Home in Seattle's University District, where she's the Housing Navigator and shares the role of Day Center Coordinator. Her Companis service with EGH was a natural fit: Karen's helped lead shelter and transitional housing programs for our homeless neighbors in Waukesha, WI, as well as in several Northern Illinois locations since the 1990's.

Karen moved to Seattle in 2017 from the Chicago area to be closer to family and childhood friends and explore life in the beautiful Pacific Northwest. A friend in Chicago, a mutual acquaintance of Companis Founding Director Craig Darling, suggested she contact Companis upon her arrival in Seattle. We're so grateful she accepted that advice.

During the previous two decades, Karen served as a pastor in the Northern Illinois United Methodist Church Conference. She was solo pastor with five congregations, managing staff, budgets and resources – as well as hundreds of volunteers - throughout her tenure. Her acumen and creativity launched and re-invigorated critical social service community programs in her care, including food and nutrition services, after-school programs and more.

Karen is a lifelong learner, and holds a BA in Leadership Development, and a Masters in Theological Study from Garrett Seminary at Northwestern University. She's also a teacher, certified in multiple disciplines, including spiritual direction, and taught humanities for three years at the community college level. Walking with others along a journey of shared curiosity through community service is a natural fit for Karen.

Karen says, "I am in awe of the beauty of the Pacific Northwest – the mountains which are part of our horizon, the beauty of the flowers, the trees – oh, the trees - and even the mystery of stormy skies. And I love the expression of that beauty through the art that is created in this area. My desire to work to protect Mother Earth goes hand-in-hand with my love of journeying with people because I choose to live with the understanding that we are all related. I have found a place here where I feel very much connected to 'my relations.' I have found that here I can do anything, hear anything and see more than I can imagine. This is also a place where I can find people of like mind to work, to play, to explore and to create. I have quickly felt very much at home here."

Karen's warm and positive energy, natural hospitality and keen intellect will help lead the Companis program of creating healthy community by fostering skilled volunteer service. When you see Karen, please know she's looking forward to meeting you.

We wrap up our our 2017-2018 season in a concert with a lot of things going on.

A familiar voice in the Portland area jazz scene, Paula Byrne is on tour in the Pacific Northwest and we've invited her to debut at Seattle Jazz Vespers.

Paula Byrne's voice is like chilled champagne on a hot summer day. She moves easily between songs that are lush and beautiful to highly rhythmic, wild rides. Her sense of humor, revival of obscure songs and new twists on old standards keeps the audience engaged and enraptured.
