

Greta Matassa - vocals, Brian Monroney - guitar, Clipper Anderson - bass, Mark Ivester - drums, and Alexev Nikolaev - sax

In the Pacific Northwest, where she built her career, Greta Matassa wins wide acclaim; 8 times, the readers of Earshot, the Seattle jazz magazine, have voted her the best jazz vocalist in the Northwest including another award 2021.

Our Heritage Hymns

Our Heritage Hymns
Bring Us Home - Rodney Romney/Peter Strauch
A senior minister of the Seattle First Baptist Church from 1980 to 2000, Rev. Rodney
Romney was also a gifted wordsmith and brilliant lyricist. After hearing one of German
Pastor Peter Strauch's most popular hymns, Herr, wir bitten komm und segne uns
(Lord, we pray, come and bless us), he commented in Seasons of the Soul that it had
seemed to match the words which were "buzzing" in his head. After the death of a
church member caused by AIDS and the coming together of his alienated family, he
was inspired to write down the words to Bring Us Home. As it resonated with all who
heard it, Rev. Romney later began to use the hymn at Homecoming Sunday. Because it
stands not only for the reconvergence of God's people at church but also for bringing
back His "scattered people home," its meaning has proven its relevance for all times.

All are Welcome - Marty Haugen All are Welcome - Marty Haugen
Marty Haugen was born in 1950 in Minnesota and was raised in the Lutheran Church.
Haugen holds a B.A. degree in psychology from Luther College and an M.A. degree in pastoral studies from the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul. During the past three decades, he has presented workshops and concerts throughout the world, made some 40 recordings, and written over 400 compositions, not only for his own church, the United Church of Christ, but also for Roman Catholic, Lutheran and other Protestant congregations. Along with David Haas and Jan Michael Joncas, Haugen has been the voice of liturgical music for his generation following Vatican II. All Are Welcome, written in 1994, has become one of his most well-known songs

You Have Come Down to the Lakeshore (Tú has venido a la orilla) - Cesáreo Gabaráin Born in 1936, Cesáreo Gabaráin served as a priest in the Basque country and in Madrid and as Chaplain Prelate to Pope John Paul II. However, he was more renowned as an award-winning composer, writing more than 500 hymns before succumbing to cancer at age 55 in 1991. After the Second Vatican Council, he found a new freedom of musical style. Written in 1979, Tú has venido a la orilla (You Have Come Down to the Lakeshore) is his best known hymn, having been translated into 80 languages and also used in two films. Written in the first person, the text, while based on Jesus' call to Peter and Andrew to follow him, is also directed at the singer with the same intent. Besides his fame as composer, Gabaráin was renowned for his athleticism and ministering to those participating in the Tour de France and to soccer players in Madrid. Madrid.

The organ/piano search committee is thrilled to introduce Christian Broughton as our new organist/pianist and communications manager. For over nine years, Christian has been working as a professional musician and Episcopal music director in central New York. His father is a retired minister who served at First Baptist Church in Tacoma (now Urban Grace) from 1987 to 1997. He is thrilled to have this opportunity to return to his American Baptist roots — and to the Pacific Northwest, which he still considers home. We are thrilled to be in worship with him today for our fall Homecoming celebration.

Christian studied organ with Stephen Best, Dean of the Central New York Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. In support of Christian's application as our organist/pianist, Stephen Best wrote to the search committee that, "when we worked on recital music, there was no question that he had that 'something extra' that we who teach treasure in our students." In his interview, Christian made clear that above all else, accompanying the church's song — leading the congregation in great hymns from the organ — is what he finds most important in his calling as a church musician.

In addition to his wonderfully sensitive piano playing, the search committee was also struck by his honesty and warm spirit.

Christian has many talents: his degree from Roberts Wesleyan College in Rochester, New York is in both music and graphic design. He also has experience with church communications and media, so as he begins his relationship with Seattle First Baptist as our new organist and pianist, he will also be working with our church staff in charge of church communications.
