# ALL ARE WELCOME SUNDAY MORNING SERIES ON IMMIGRANTS & REFUGEES

A number of years ago, Seattle First Baptist Church adopted a set of values. There are six of them. Number Four reads:

We will welcome the stranger, including immigrants and refugees, as our Scriptures instruct. We will explore how to support their causes and advocate for justice, remembering that many of us are the children of immigrants and refugees.

We often think of refugees and immigrants in these times only as those seeking refuge at our Southern border. Of course, we DO want to think about the plight of those particular people—especially the refugees from violence, political persecution, hunger and extreme poverty in Latin America, the families separated, the ones who are ill, those who have died or lost loved ones on this dangerous journey.

But there are others to consider as well. Those who have fled Afghanistan or Ukraine or Syria or other places of danger around the world. Those who have come here for an education they we're unable to get in their home country. Those who have fled oppressive

regimes or whose lives are expressly threatened. Those who could not live freely as LGBTQIA+ persons in their home countries or as women's and girls' rights activists. Those fleeing religious persecution. Those who fill the ever-present need in local tech industries. Those who fought in or supported US conflicts abroad. Those who seek to improve the economic lives of their children or grandchildren. Those who do the work most US citizens will not do in order to support family back home.

Imagine leaving the only home you've ever known and going somewhere where you do not speak the language or know the customs or the music. Imagine only being able to obtain food that is unfamiliar—maybe even distasteful to your palate. Imagine feeling out of place and perhaps unwelcome at every turn. Imagine having no family or friends nearby. Imagine wondering, always, what "home" means. Each immigrant or refugee's story is unique. All are important.

When deciding how exactly to offer a group focusing on justice for immigrants and refugees (a HUGE topic!), Small Groups Ministry decided to start close to home. We have many in our congregation who came to this country as immigrants or as refugees—some long ago, some more recently. Their stories are powerful, and most of us have not heard them. As a congregation we are poorer for lacking that knowledge! During the seven weeks of ALL ARE WELCOME, we will be witnessing a few of those stories.

We will also be discerning, individually and collectively, what it truly means to be a welcoming church. What does it mean in terms of how we interact with new people who show up at coffee hour—maybe with limited English skills, maybe looking a bit "lost?" What does it mean in terms of how we worship, what music we sing, how we nurture the children of our congregation? How can we grow in our ability to ensure that ALL ARE WELCOME.

Do not miss out. These stories will change us—if we are willing to collaborate with the storytellers, with Spirit, and with one another, in love. A huge thankyou to Muriel Jones-Cashdollar and Steve Smith for stepping up to lead this series!

**Kelly Latimore** is an artist, who as a member of a social justice community called The Common Friars, started creating unique modern icons in 2011. He says of his work "My hope is that these icons do what all art can potentially do, which is, to create more dialogue. This particular icon depicts the Holy Family (in Spanish, La Sagrada Familia—the title of the work), fleeing as refugees to Egypt.

# HALLELUJAH! IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN PLACE AT THE TABLE DINNERS JANUARY 28th



Back by popular demand! These dinners are held three times a year and are, without a doubt, one of the most well-loved events held by SFBC. Started by Joan Benner just before the pandemic forced us all into isolation, Place at the Table offers members of the congregation the opportunity to host or attend dinners in private homes. Here's how it works:

1. For a couple of Sundays, there are sign-up sheets in the Fellowship Hall down near the Welcome Table after Worship, where people who would like to host a small number of fellow church folks in their home for a potluck meal can sign up to do so. You get to say how many people you are able to host, what timeframe works best for you, and what is needed in terms of what others bring to the feast.

- 2. Then for a couple of weeks after that, anyone in the congregation can reserve a spot at one of the dinners—by going to Coffee Hour after the morning service and signing up for the venue of their choice. Tables are set up in Fellowship Hall near the Welcome Table—with sign-up sheets showing who's hosting and their addresses. You just print your name in an open spot. (After this part, hosts contact participants with all the details.)
- 3. For those who cannot attend an in-person event, there is a Virtual Place at the Table Dinner on Zoom. The link is in the church calendar. No reservation is necessary.

Those who have attended these events in the past have glowed with stories of finding out they were not the only one with certain beliefs, or about how they met someone who grew up in the next town over from them in another state, or about discovering what a wicked sense of humor some fellow church member has, or about how they got to know someone new to the congregation. This is how community is built. This is how the early Jesus-followers did things. Don't miss out!

# UPDATE FROM THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

Seattle First Baptist Church is actively searching for a second pastor to join Pastor Anita in ministering to our beloved community. Have you had questions about the search? Below are answers to some commonly asked questions.

# Are we looking for a new lead pastor or a "co-pastor"?

The new pastor will not be a lead pastor. The new pastor will be a "co-pastor" along with our current pastor, Rev. Anita Peebles. The two of them will serve as co-equal members of a two-person pastoral team, and will jointly share responsibility for all pastoral duties.

# Are the guest preachers who we've recently hosted auditioning for the role as co-pastor?

No. The schedule for guest preachers is unrelated to the search activities.

# When will SFBC have a second permanent pastor?

Searches for permanent full-time pastors usually take about 12 to 18 months. The search team began its search in May 2022, and we are hopeful that the search won't take longer than normal.

#### Who is on the search team?

The search team members are Bruce Chittick (co-chair), Bob Sittig (co-chair), Jim Thompson (vice chair), Carole Cornell, Aaron Burkhalter, Janet Hasselblad, Darla O'Brian, and Lucy Robinson.

#### PLEDGE UPDATE

Pledge Sunday, the day we make a financial commitment to supporting our church, was October 30th. We had good participation but expect slightly lower numbers this year both in the number of pledges and the amount pledged.

For 2022 we had 139 people who pledged and gave or are in electronic giving.

For 2023 we have 127 pledges so far.

Total pledge amount for 2022 was \$408,000

Total pledge amount to date for 2023 is \$376,100. With the addition of anticipated pledges, this number should rise to about \$396,100

# MAYBE THE NEW YEAR IS A GOOD TIME FOR PERSONAL GROWTH CONSIDER COMING TO BRAVE SPACE!



Our church chose a couple of years ago to make a commitment to becoming antiracist. Antiracist does not mean perfect. Antiracist means being willing to examine the systems which keep racism alive and to work to change what needs changing. It means being willing to look at myself and the ways in which I have (unknowingly) contributed to a system which favors white folks over black, indigenous, and other people of color. It means being willing to look at our church in those same ways.

When most white folks first hear "antiracist," we are confused. We think "I'm not racist. Why are we talking about this? I'm a good person. This is a good church. Antiracist sounds so negative." We think that "racist" refers to cross-burning KKK members or flat-out bigots only—certainly not members of progressive Christian churches like ours. But the language we use to talk about racism has changed significantly in recent years. There's a difference between "not racist" and "antiracist."

Jason Reynolds, who co-authored Stamped: Racism, Antiracism and You with Ibram X. Kendi used a baseball analogy to explain this. "If you think about baseball, to be not racist is going for a bunt. You hold the bat out. You hope the ball hits the bat so that you can attempt to make a play," he said. "To be antiracist is to swing the bat as hard as you can and go for the home run; to put in the extra effort to shoot for the stars. You risk the strike, but you swing that bat as hard as you can every single time because you understand that that's the way you change things."

Taking such risks takes courage. The SFBC Brave Space group, which arose following a study group on the book White Fragility after the murder of George Floyd, is for white-identified members and friends of our congregation who wish to keep moving along the spectrum from "not racist" to "antiracist" and in doing so, to help our church do the same. This Group meets on the 1st and 3rd Monday evenings of the month from 6-7pm on Zoom to support one another in this process. We focus on Learning (educating ourselves because there's always more to learn), Healing (because we've all caused harm without even realizing it and need to heal, rather than sit frozen in shame), and Practicing (becoming better and braver in speaking out and taking action about racism). Note that action does not only mean going to a demonstration. There are myriad little ways to stand up to racism in our daily lives, and it is our goal to recognize and tend to those. Consider joining us. New folks are welcome any time. Batter up!

# SACREDLY SPEAKING: GOD-TALK ABOUT REPRODUCTIVE FREEDOM

The Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice (RCRC), in partnership with Seattle First Baptist Church and the Evergreen Region of American Baptists present, "Sacredly Speaking: God-Talk About Reproductive Freedom," a Zoom event January 26, 2023, 5:00-6:30 pm PT.

After the Supreme Court's ruling on June 24th that overturned a half-century precedent on reproductive rights, many of us are left wondering, "What now?" Many of us (both pastors and laity) are wondering how to speak about abortion with our congregations. Many of us are wondering how to speak about this with friends, family, and neighbors who might not agree with us. As people of faith who have taken up Jesus's calling to work for justice, how do we be the voice that advocates for abortion rights from the perspective of progressive Christianity?

If you have been asking these questions, please join us. The topics for the program will include:

- Understanding Reproductive Oppression. Historical overview setting the stage for reproductive oppression and Intersectionality today.
- Liberation Gospel. "What kind of society are we called to be?"
- Sacredly Speaking. How to talk about abortion and reproductive dignity with family, neighbors, and coworkers.
- Ways to Be Involved. Practical ways to make a difference now.

#### **Presenters**

Rev. Brandee Jasmine Mimitzraiem is the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice's (RCRC) Director of Institutional Engagement and Public Theology. Rev. Brandee Jasmine leads efforts to move outside of strictly-Christian spaces and into reproductive justice (RJ) spaces, incorporating a diverse and

multi-faith strategy into RCRC's work. Rev. Brandee Jasmine was ordained an itinerant elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 2003 and has pastored congregations in Utah, Kansas, and Nebraska.



She prioritizes the well-being within the real-lived experiences of Black Queer women and children, and works to create and sustain safe places across the intersectional realities of race, sexuality, gender expression, and class within the Church and in communities. She has two donor-conceived sons and two dogs (she calls them "models of pastoral leadership"), all of whom keep life full of laughter. Rev. Brandee Jasmine is a proud member of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc.



Professor, author, thought coach, and multi-media personality, **Rt. Rev. Edward Donalson III**, DMin is a visionary with a dynamic message of empowerment. Born in Philadelphia, PA and cultivated in Seattle, WA as a bi-coastal youth, he developed a heart for diversity and an ability to navigate all socioeconomic, educational, and ethnic spheres. Traveling nationally as a guest lecturer, workshop clinician, and preacher since 1996, he is a constructive theologian with a liberative lens. His scholarship centers intersectional theology as an emerging discipline.

With a Bachelor of Theology, a Masters of Art in Global Leadership and a Doctorate of Ministry. Dr. Donalson speaks a life affirming message to all people. The hallmarks of his work include an emphasis on combating imperialist, anti-Black, capitalists, cisheteropatriarchy.

Dr. Donalson has authored several books: Moments of Worship; More Moments of Worship; THINK! Retooling Your Mind for Kingdom Success; THINK Again! The

Roadmap to Kingdom Greatness; Unlocking the Genius Within: Essays on Greatness; Get Your Life: Affirmations, Inspirations, and Intentions; and In My Own Words; the Contemplative Life of a 21st Century Bishop, and is also the compiler of two anthologies: On Becoming and Yes I'm a Christian; a Practical Theology for an Emerging Generation. Dr. Donalson's release on Cascade Books: #BlackLivesMatter: Toward an Intersectional Theology is foundational in the discipline of Intersectional Theology.

Dr. Edward Donalson, III is the Director of Doctor of Ministry for the School of Theology and Ministry of Seattle University where he serves as core faculty, teaching in multiple degree programs. Currently serving as Senior Pastor of Kingdom Family Worship Center Int'l he is the Presiding Prelate of Freedom Assemblies Worldwide. He is the current Dean of The College of Affirming Bishops while concurrently serving as a Senior Bishop in the Fellowship of Affirming Ministries. Dr. Donalson is also the Bishop of Operations for the P.U.R.E. Ministries International Fellowship Churches and serves both on the Boards of The Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice and Faith Action Network. In his spare time Dr. Donalson is also a board member of Interconnected Justice: A Pan African world movement.



Rev. Dr. Cari Jackson is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, who has served as pastor of congregations in UCC, United Methodist Church and Presbyterian Church-USA. She formerly served as director of spiritual care and activism for the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice. She is president of Excellent Way which integrates interspiritual wisdom for individual and organizational transformation. She has served as adjunct faculty at Union Theological Seminary and One Spirit Interfaith Seminary. Dr. Cari holds a Ph.D. in Christian Social Ethics, Master of Divinity, Juris Doctor, and Bachelor of Arts in Psychology and Sociology. She is the author of five books including The Gift to Listen, The Courage to Hear, Love Like You've Never Been Hurt; and For the Souls of Black Folks; and contributing author to Sisters in Mourning.

# **2023 Proposed Romney Legacy Fund Disbursements**

# \$13,000 for Three Organizations

**\$5,000 to Operation Nightwatch.** Operation Nightwatch is dedicated to reducing the impact of poverty and homelessness. In addition to operating twenty-four units for low-income seniors, Operation Nightwatch dispatches volunteers throughout Seattle each night to deliver hot meals to unhoused individuals.

**\$5,000 to Helping Link.** Helping Link is dedicated to empowering Vietnamese-Americans' social adjustment, family stability and self-sufficiency while nurturing community service and youth leaders. The organization provides educational programs and resources in language, technology, and citizenship.

**\$3,000 to Women United.** This organization works to strengthen kindship families and meet the needs of grandmothers who are raising grandchildren. Women United achieves this mission by offering unity, family reconciliation, the teaching of socio-emotions skills, and positive self-determination.

## \$10,000 for the Romney Lecture Series

**\$2,000 for Genjo Marinello.** Genjo Marinello was with us in 2022 and will join us again in 2023 for a weekend of Buddhist meditation and discussion. He will be with us in April 2023.

**\$8,000** for Cole Arthur Riley. Cole Arthur Riley is a writer and poet. She is the author of This Here Flesh: Spirituality, Liberation, and the Stories that Make us. She currently serves as the spiritual teacher in residence at Cornell University. She is also the creator of Black Liturgies, a space that integrates spiritual practice with Black emotion, Black literature, and the Black Body. Cole will be with us in June 2023.

## \$2,000 to be used as needed

The committee is setting aside \$2,000 to meet any emerging needs during 2023.

## **Changes in 2022 Expenditures**

Due primarily to Covid and scheduling issues, we needed to reschedule one of our intended speakers for 2022. And we weren't able to schedule two of the speakers we were hoping to bring to the church. This left us with \$20,000 in unspent funds for 2022. These funds will be re-allocated for use in 2023.
