## God of Grace and God of Glory - Harry Emerson Fosdick/John Hughes

Although Harry Emerson Fosdick was a Baptist, he became pastor of New York's First Presbyterian Church in 1918. He became a central figure in the controversy over ecclesiology when he gave a sermon presenting the Bible "as a record of the unfolding of God's will, not as the literal 'Word of God." He resigned from that church in 1925 and went to preach at the Park Avenue Baptist Church. There, Fosdick, a champion of the social gospel in the midst of the Great Depression, befriended John D. Rockefeller, Jr. one of its members. The two soon conceived the Riverside Church, which, according to a 2008 New York Times article, has become "a stronghold of activism and political debate... influential on the nation's religious and political landscapes." *God of Grace and God of Glory* was written for the dedication of the new church in 1930. The hymn used to be sung to *Regent Square*, but was paired with Welsh composer's *CWM Rhondda* in 1935 to greater success.

## Abide with me - Henry Francis Lyte/William Henry Monk

Born in Scotland in 1793, Henry Francis Lyte was sent to school in Ireland. After becoming an Anglican priest in 1815, he served in several towns in England while raising his family. An accomplished flutist, Lyte also spoke Latin, Greek and French, and, at his last post in Brixham, built one of the largest libraries in England. He wrote the words and a tune to *Abide with me* shortly before he passed away in 1847. Although Lyte's tune was considered by some as "dull," the hymn was paired in 1861 successfully with another tune, *Eventide*, by William Henry Monk, who was in mourning for the death of his three-year-old daughter. More recently, the hymn was sung at the 2012 Summer Olympics opening ceremony. It is still sung at annual national services in several Commonwealth countries and is played at Republic Day celebrations in New Delhi.
