Heritage Hymn Notes:

"Bring Many Names" - Brian Wren/Carlton Young

Born in England, Brian Wren was a minister, professor, and a writer of more than 250 hymns. Wren recalls that his inspiration to write hymns was his interest in the language of prayer. At the beginning of his career in the early 60s, Catholic masses were held still in Latin and Protestant services were held in Elizabethan English. Wren had the "conviction that we need to speak the truth about ourselves and the world we live in and that we need to speak of God and to God in 'our' language." The text of *Bring Many Names* evolved over several years due to opposition by some to the line "Strong mother God, working night and day." Carlton Young, considered by many to be "the most significant Methodist musician since the Wesleys," composed the tune. This hymn has been accepted as one which "will take its place in the permanent canon of great hymnody."
