Hey y'all,

Somehow, it is late March and Easter is upon us! Admittedly, I have never considered Easter one of my favorite holidays, but each year I find that it is the one I need most. I need Jesus to get up. I need to be reminded and to see year after year that death does not get the last word. I need resurrection.

Many people over the course of my ministry have asked me if I really believe Jesus rose from the dead. They want to know if I really believe that early in the morning while it was still dark Jesus got up in body and in spirit and walked right on out of that tomb. And y'all know what? I do. Something that I wholeheartedly, unwaveringly believe is that Jesus rose from the dead in the exact same body he was crucified in. His body still had the marks on his hands and in his side. The same Jesus that was crucified is the Jesus that got up. Thanks be to God!

It matters that Jesus arose in body and in spirit. It matters that his body still had the scars of crucifixion. What happens to bodies here and now on this earth matters. Bodies matter. The hope of resurrection gives us hope for resurrection in our own bodies, not just in the hereafter, but right now. We can practice and live into resurrection right here, right now.

One of my favorite Easter poems is "Manifesto: The Mad Farmer Liberation Front" by Wendell Berry. He shows how to live into and practice resurrection right here, right now. I particularly love the last couple stanzas:

Expect the end of the world. Laugh. Laughter is immeasurable. Be joyful though you have considered all the facts. So long as women do not go cheap for power, please women more than men. Ask yourself: Will this satisfy a woman satisfied to bear a child? Will this disturb the sleep of a woman near to giving birth?

Go with your love to the fields. Lie down in the shade. Rest your head in her lap. Swear allegiance to what is nighest your thoughts. As soon as the generals and the politicos can predict the motions of your mind, lose it. Leave it as a sign to mark the false trail, the way you didn't go. Be like the fox who makes more tracks than necessary, some in the wrong direction. Practice resurrection.

Each year I feel we need resurrection more than the year before, but the reality is that we desperately need resurrection always. The Good News is that nothing can stop Jesus from getting up in body and in spirit and walking out of that tomb.

Friends, this Easter, be joyful though you have considered all the facts and practice resurrection today and all days.

Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!





About the Author

Jim Wallis is Georgetown University's inaugural holder of the Archbishop Desmond Tutu Chair in Faith and Justice, and the Director of its new Center on Faith and Justice. He served on President Obama's first White House Advisory Council on Faith-based and Neighborhood Partnerships, and is the author of multiple New York Times bestselling books, including God's Politics. In 2022 and 2023, Washingtonian magazine named Wallis one of the 500 most influential people shaping policy in DC. Wallis is also the founder of Sojourners.

Vegan dishes avoid all animal foods including meat, fish, shellfish, insects, dairy, eggs, and honey. A vegetarian dish may include eggs, dairy products, and honey. It does not include meat, poultry, fish, seafood, insects, gelatin or animal rennet, or stock and fat from animals.

Class: Planet vs. Plastics: Prayerful Actions to Save the Earth At SFBC Sunday, April 28, 9:30–10:30am


Planet vs. Plastics is the global theme for Earth Day

SEATTLE JAZZ VESPERS PRESENTS MARK LEWIS QUARTET APRIL 7, 2024 at 6pm



Saxophonist, Flutist, Composer, Educator Seattle area native Mark Lewis is a well-traveled saxophonist and flutist who has created a large body of jazz music over the past four decades. He's been a part of jazz scenes from Seattle and San Francisco to Rotterdam and Paris.

His latest album, Naked Animals, was recorded in 1990 with his Quartet from the Netherlands. It's an important historical recording of a working neo-bop Quartet that had an enthusiastic following for more than a decade. His 2017 release The New York Session features piano legend George Cables, veteran bassist Essiet Essiet and drummer Victor Lewis. Mark was rated number two for alto saxophone (after Richie Cole) and number three for flute (after Charles Lloyd and Hubert Laws) in the 39th Annual Jazz Station Awards for his work on this album.

Recent awards include Cadence Magazine Top Ten Critics Poll for 2021 for his album Naked Animals, and #2 on alto sax (after Richie Cole) and #3 on flute (after Charles Lloyd and Hubert Laws) in the 39th Annual Jazz Station Awards for his album The New York Session, a collaboration with piano legend George Cables, bassist Essiet Essiet, and drummer Victor Lewis.

Music writer Ted Gioia, known as a leading global guide to music past, present and future, says of Mark Lewis: "You listen to the guys with the primo recording contracts on the very top labels, and in my opinion, they're not in Mark's league."
