Dear church family,

Well, it's here! My sabbatical begins on May 12 and runs through August 11. Sabbaticals are important to the health of both pastors and congregations. Pastoral work is emotionally taxing and complex work-it is also meaningful and enjoyable, but I can't pretend it's not hard. So, pastors need periods of rest and relaxation, time away to care for ourselves and our families. We need space to put our vocation to the side and focus on simply being human. I hope my sabbatical will provide space for me to reflect on the last seven years of ministry with SFBC and allow me time to explore my own relationship with the Sacred in a new way. At least, that's my plan for this time away! During this time, I will completely step away from my pastoral duties with SFBC. Pastor Leigh will be available for all pastoral care needs. Please be generous with your respect and affirmation for Pastor Leigh during this time when she will be carrying the full responsibility of pastoring this church.

And speaking of the church, sabbaticals can be important for congregations as well. As institutions, churches can easily become set in their ways, even progressive churches! SFBC has been doing ministry in and with Seattle for 156 years—there's a lot of tradition, history, memory, (and dare I say comfort with the status quo?) that we have to metabolize within our congregation as we continue discerning what it means for us to follow the Way of Jesus in our time and place. Sabbaticals can serve as a jolt to the system, an opportunity to experience life shared in community differently, an opening for playfulness and creativity, or even a reminder for the congregation itself to take time to rest and restore.

During my sabbatical I will be: visiting with family and friends in the Midwest; completing a walking pilgrim-

age in the Scottish borders; visiting the burgh of Peebles, Scotland, my surname's namesake; retreating at Iona Abbey and Ring Lake Ranch; and, of course, working on my ever-growing reading list—hopefully in a hammock near water.

I'll probably do some writing as well, but I'm hoping to evade the temptation to produce a particular amount of words or a manuscript. Sabbatical is about restoration toward wholeness (sabbath!) and does not compute in the language of our Western capitalist economy. Too often I fall into the trap of thinking that my productivity defines my worth, and that is pretty much counter to everything sabbatical is about. So I plan to embrace my humanity--beautiful and messy and challenging and silly and all-- by getting out of my normal routine, leaving my comfort zones, and exploring new places geographically and spiritually.

And I hope you can practice a sabbatical this summer in some way as well. You don't need to travel extensively or try a grand new activity or change everything about your life. Pick one day, even one hour, sometime during your week, where you do something that is just for you. Something that nurtures your soul, feeds your curiosity, expands your compassion for yourself and others. I wonder where God is leading your spirit towards wholeness? May finding out be an adventure this summer.

I am immensely grateful to Pastor Leigh, our administrator Darren, the rest of the staff, the Personnel committee and my "sabbatical team" who have been cheerleaders for me as I plan this time of restoration. I am so grateful to be on your team.

#### THRIVING CONGREGATIONS AWAB LEARNING COMMUNITY: GOD CALLS OUR CHURCH TO TRIVE!



In November 2024, Pastor Leigh Curl-Dove, Jacob Maez, Sue Ross and Kira Walmsley kicked off a sixmonth learning community with three other Northwest AWAB congregations. Since then, the SFBC cohort has enjoyed monthly meetings to explore each of the five traits of thriving congregations, as defined by the program.

These traits are outlined by the program, however, our cohort has defined what we believe these traits mean for SFBC:

- **Rooted Relationships** are when we mutually see, hear, know, and love one another for our authentic, true selves.
- **Compelling Clarity** is the "gut" feeling, a calm knowing. It is being grounded in our "why."
- Faithful Agility is being ready to joyfully pivot to whatever challenge or opportunity is presented, while still centering our goal, our calling, our "why."
- Holy Tenacity is persistently following God's call. It is what is needed to withstand challenges, and to follow through on compelling clarity.
- **Dynamic Collaboration** is actively participating in an interconnected network of care, where we mutually support and are supported.

These five traits combined lead to a thriving church community. In our meetings we often reflect on how the single trait we are exploring is interdependent with the other traits.

Digging into these traits is designed to get us thinking about our church's strengths, assets, opportunities, and unique calling as a church. In early May, the last stage of the cohort will design what the program calls the "Faithful Experiment." This could be a program, activity, new tradition, service, social group, or anything else that will equip us to better answer SFBC's call. 

Seattle Jazz Vespers is proud to welcome back the Susan Pascal Quintet.



Seattle jazz vibraphonist Susan Pascal has played four tours of Singapore and concerts, workshops and clinics across the United States. Her Pacific Northwest appearances include the Earshot Jazz Festival and Centrum Jazz Port Townsend, and as a special guest artist with the Seattle Repertory Jazz Orchestra, the Seattle Baroque Orchestra, and Seattle's Gypsy jazz group, Pearl Django.

Pascal's eclectic musical interests are reflected in her own projects. Susan Pascal's SOUL SAUCE quintet is a tribute to Latin jazz icon Cal Tjader, and her new BRAZIL PROJECT band features the rich rhythmic and melodic traditions of Brazil. Her straight-ahead jazz group, the Susan Pascal Quartet has been nominated twice for Best Acoustic Group by Seattle's Earshot Jazz.

Pascal is heard on motion picture soundtracks including "The Wedding Planner," "Office Space," "Eulogy," and "Mirror, Mirror" and is a guest artist on recordings by vocalist Greta Matassa, "All This and Heaven Too," "And to All a Good Night," and "The Smiling Hour"; the Vern Sielert's Dektet recording, "From There to Here"; slide guitarist Orville Johnson's "Slide and Joy"; and many others.

During the interlude, we will be awarding the Shirley Cline Memorial "Young Jazz Artist" scholarship.

This will be our last concert of our 2024-2025 season. Our 24th season begins again on October 5, 2025 at 6:00pm.
